POSITIVE CHOICES

During this term, Year 9 and 10 students have had the opportunity to experience a drop down day run by a group called Positive Choices. As the name suggests, the main aim of this day is to encourage young people to make positive choices in their life and avoid negative ones.

Students were thoroughly engaged by the guest speakers which included (amongst others) a mother who had lost her son to knife crime, a reformed gang member and prisoner who now speaks to young people about avoiding grooming and similar mistakes to his own, a reformed drug dealer who now runs a business which focuses on personal training for young people with behavioural problems and the West Yorkshire police who took the students step-by-step through a murder investigation.

The sessions were thought provoking and students asked insightful questions of all the quests. We hope that the students take away the main message of the day which was to think carefully about the choices that they are making on a daily basis and ensure that they are as positive as possible.

Whilst we hope that the our students are not exposed to dangerous things outside school, we recognise that the society that we live in can be dangerous for anyone, no matter how well looked after they are. Exposure to the lived experience of people who have made some poor choices in their life and an understanding of the consequences of these choices should make our students better equipped to make the right choices if they are faced with similar ones.


